- TOEFL or IELTS (may be waived for some English speaking countries).

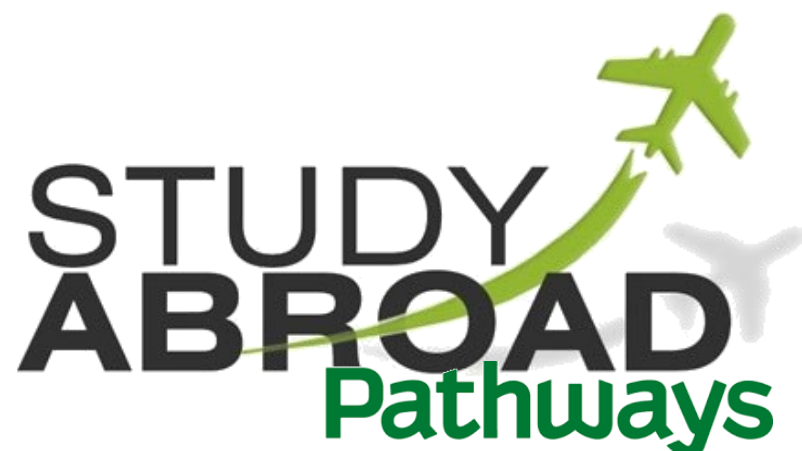

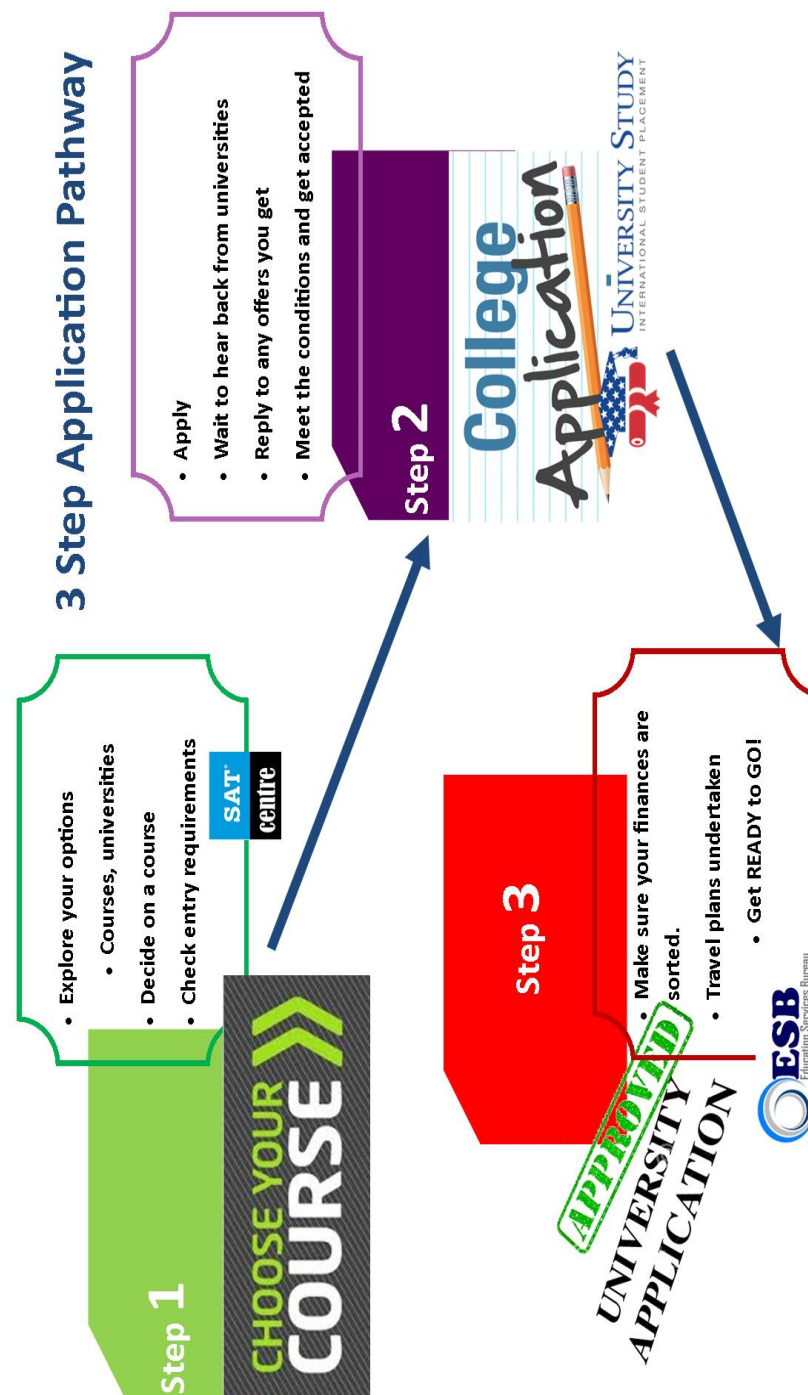

DON'T leave it until the last minute

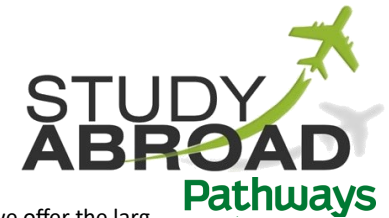
DON'T use suggested synonyms unless you're sure what they mean

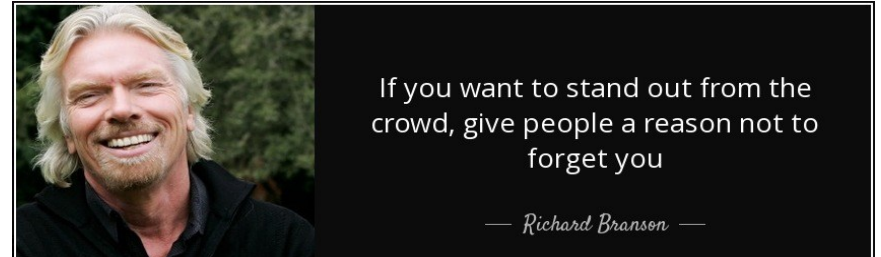

Personal Statement Writing Tips

It's about you and it's not about "you". The problem is people see the wording 'Personal Statement' and think this is a green light to write about themselves. Let your 'Personal Statement' explore aspects of you and bring them forth with precision. Your personal statement is a way of marketing yourself to university admissions tutors. The aim is get those offers. With admission staff endlessly going through extensive applications, good grades and good references are a given but that's certainly not enough. So your personal statement is the key to set you apart from the rest. Your personal statement is where you can distinguish yourself from other candidates; fill in the picture a tutor has of you in their head; and leave a real impression that makes them want to meet you or offer you a place!



Where To Start

To start with, jot down reasons why you want to study your chosen course. Is it a new passion or an old interest? Were you inspired by something you read or does it lead towards the career you would eventually like to pursue – in which case, what is it that appeals to you about that career?

Secondly, think about what you can say you have done to demonstrate why you are passionate about this particular subject. Have you taken part in a society or club outside of school? Do you enjoy reading about your subject, if yes, what books particularly interest you and why?

Have you worked in any roles that help with skills that universities might find appealing? Have you helped fellow students at school, have you volunteered or undertaken work experience in your field? In summation;

- **Why does this role interest you?**
- **Why are you suited to this role?**
- **Do you have any previous jobs or training that relate to this line of work?**
- **Have you taken part in any projects that help demonstrate your capabilities?**
- **What specialist skills do you have that make you an ideal candidate?**

Once you've answered these questions, you'll have a better idea of what you have to offer. This can then determine the structure of your statement, as you'll know what to emphasize and what to downplay. For instance, if you don't have any practical work experience, you can always touch on your academic accomplishments or transferable skills gleaned from gap year work, initiatives and so on
